EMERGING ARTIST WINNER

OF 2002 Meet Mindy Michelle Hawkins, this

year's recipient of AJF's Emerging Artist Award.

We recently caught up with Mindy who was getting married at the time the award was presented and relocating with her husband to Houston, Texas.

WE WANTED TO KNOW, WHAT ACTUALLY GOT YOU STARTED IN JEWELRY/METALS?

It was the dynamic personality of Robly Glover, professor at Texas Tech University. I can only describe this man as the teacher I would one day love to be. He is an energetic whirtwind, whose words, work, and actions could inspire just about anyone. He got me excited about the possibilities of what was possible in metals, and once I got going I couldn't stop.

US. They are pieces that may be recognized as figures, dolls or toys, but it is the content of the piece that is most important.

I see them as small sculptures that cross the boundaries between defined areas. I do not intent them to actually be used as toys, but I do wish viewers to handle them. Each is a reflection of an event or experience that changed the way I view the world.

MINDY MICHELLE HAWKINS:

NOW THAT YOU HAVE GRADUATED, WHAT'S NEXT?

I am searching for a career that will keep me strong in the field. I've encountered the difficulties of weighing the need for money against the preciousness of time at my bench. Currently, I'm gaining experience in a corporate setting, but this can only be temporary. I'm actively searching for a position that will allow me to grow both as an artist and an instructor. I now see how precious the creative community is, and that being part of one is an incredible experience. Many don't see things the way we do, and it's reassuring to find others who understand. I believe teaching would be a rewarding career.

This was the third year for the Emerging Artist Award and thanks to our members the award was increased this year to \$1,500.

This year's judges were Mia McEldowney, independent curator, collector, CERF trustee AJF board member and membe of Art Table, along with Sandy Grotta, an interior designer and trustee of the American Crafts Museum, and member of the Collectors Circle, AJF and Friend of Contemporary Ceramics, and a craft collector; and Suzanne Baizerman, the Imogene Gieling Curator of Crafts and Decorative Art at Oakland Museum of California, Said Ms. Baizerman: "In the course of jurying slides for this award, I was immediately struck by Ms. Hawkin's work. It had a presence. The subjects drew me in, arousing my curiosity. Were there stories imbedded within the pieces? The various materials that were combined intrigued me. Not inconsequentially, the works
