WHY HAVE THE ART JEWELRY FORUM?

s the Art Jewelry Forum builds its membership, people ask the question: Why should I join? In an era of packed schedules, limited spare time and continual requests for donations, this is a legitimate question. So, it seemed time to review some of the answers about what the AJF offers, and the benefits it affords its membership.

Crafts are in the unique position of having to make their own support and advocacy groups. In the contemporary art world, the museums are the ones who organize the collecting groups and educate these people to understand what they are showing, thereby creating the critical donor and volunteer

base all museums need. The craft world has had too few museums and too few good publications to support development and education of craft connoisseurs. So, enthusiastic craft collectors started their own groups with the support and encouragement of galleries and artists. In this case, the results have been that museum collecting and development have followed the collectors instead of the other way around. The Art Jewelry

Forum was formed partly because jewelry aesthetes could see how such an association has benefited the glass, clay and fiber fields.

Ultimately, the AJF desires to serve three groups: the private collectors and public institutions who buy and collect contemporary jewelry, the artists, and the jewelry field itself.

Jewelry collectors are true aficionados: they educate themselves; they buy carefully; they go out of their way to meet important jewelers. It has always seemed strange that people who cared so much about modern jewelry should hesitate to identify themselves as collectors. An advocacy group can change this situation. The Forum was designed as a place where enthusiasts could meet one another, share tips, experiences and opinions, and become friends. They would begin to realize they were not alone in this rather unusual passion. Perhaps they would think about themselves as Jewelry Collectors, and view their collections differently. The goal here is to build a community - and, of course, to have some fun in the process. With their own organization, a number of additional benefits might follow.

Most importantly, people can learn. There aren't many places where information about contemporary jewelry is presented, and fewer still where information is tailored to enthusiasts rather than jewelry makers. The Art Jewelry Forum sponsors lectures and studio visits where members can hear outstanding jewelers talk about their work. Curators and teachers offer perspectives and insights that are not readily available. Private collections become accessible. Intricacies and subtleties that might otherwise be hidden are revealed. After all, jewelry is an art of the close-up look. Hopefully, this ongoing education will help members become true connoisseurs, not just consumers. Another point that cannot be underestimated is that artists

are affected by the knowledge that there is a group of collectors out there who are both enthusiastic and knowledgeable. If an artist knows that their work might be acknowledged and purchased, they are more likely to make something more ambitious, or even just think more seriously about what they are doing and feel more encouraged to do it. This can move the whole field ahead in a significant way.

In the long run, the Art Jewelry Forum is designed to nurture the field of contemporary art jewelry. The field isn't as big and powerful as the other craft mediums; art jewelry doesn't have its own museum (like ceramics has at Alfred), its own study center (like the fiber arts have at the Chicago Art Institute), or its own international art star (like Dale Chihuly in glass). It's healthy and vibrant, but it's small. It needs the support of dedicated collectors, and the attention of curators and writers. It needs a recognized group of advocates who museums feel will support (through loans of artwork and/or cash donations) their ideas for jewelry exhibitions and acquisitions. It needs channels of communication between all segments of the field, from makers to distributors to clients. We want to promote jewelers, assist galleries and museums, and encourage collectors: the whole shebang. The Art Jewelry Forum can do all these things. No other organization can.

That's why the AJF is important. That's why people should join and support the Forum even if they don't always participate in its events. Membership is a way of saying that you think art jewelry has an important place in contemporary society. It's a vote of confidence in the whole idea.

GETTING INVOLVED

We are looking for members of the organization to:

- I. Become one of the officers. We will be putting a new slate of officers together this year and want to know if you have the time and energy to be considered for active duty. This is a great opportunity to help chart the course of the AJF, and have direct input into the year's activities.
- Design a membership brochure which explains the AJF to those unfamiliar, curious, potential new members. (We need some good graphic design; we already have the content.)
- 3. Write an essay or even a small article for the newsletter about a jewelry topic of interest to you. You could explain why you collect jewelry, how you got started, how your views have changed, etc.
- 4. Increase membership and your own AJF experience: write or call your best friends and ask them to join.

5. Plan a special event in your area with the help of a gallery or artist or university to educate or promote jewelry to a new audience. What does your area have to offer that would be of interest to others? Who and what would you like to know more about? What professor, museum person or jeweler could you collaborate with on a special project?
