AJF Travels to PHILADELPHIA

This Fall

hiladelphia is the Art
Jewelry Forum's next
trip destination for November
7-9, 2002. Philadelphia is a
city filled with history,
architecture, art schools,
galleries, museums and fine
restaurants. This city is also
home to several very
interesting private art jewelry
collections and many
acclaimed jewelry artists.
This upcoming November trip

will include three wonderful days filled with an incredible mix of once-in-a-lifetime opportunities that only a very well connected and active Philadelphia art insider could plan. Those insiders are AJF members and gallery owners

Ruth and Rick Snyderman, this year's trip planners/hosts. The timing of the trip was chosen to allow trip participants to experience two additional events that will take place during the same weekend.

The **Philadelphia Craft Show** at the convention center is an annual show of exceptionally high quality craft in all media.

The other event is the **Clay**

Studio Dinner and Auction.

Both are worthy of a trip to Philadelphia in themselves. Here are a few of the highlights that participants can look forward to:

Great collections, new and established artists

e'll have the opportunity to see four incredible jewelry collections, each quite different from the other.

Helen Drutt has offered to open her home to see a part of her collection for this visit. We have been invited to view a private collection that includes jewelry pieces made by Alexander Calder and Louise Nevelson. Another collector's home will include a significant ethnic jewelry collection. Gail Brown has also invited us to her home for a cocktail party and a peek at her collection.

We'll visit two art schools, **Tyler School of Art** (Stanley Lechtzin) and the **University of the Arts** (Sharon Church); and we'll have a chance to visit at least five artist's studios, including **Bruce Metcalf**, **Jan Yaeger**, **Mardi Jo Cohen** and **Ray King**. We'll visit galleries, attend the Philadelphia Craft Show,

take a tour of some architecturally interesting landmarks and we'll get a chance to experience several notable restaurants. The Snydermans have generously invited us to their home for a special dinner on Friday evening. An added treat for this dinner evening will be a chance to meet the Snyderman's additional guests, reknown ceramic artists Robert Brady and Sandy Simon. The Clay Studio dinner/auction and afternoon gala/silent auction will take place during our visit, so for those who have a special interest in clay and would like to attend these events (Saturday evening November 9th and Sunday afternoon November 10th), arrangements can be made through the Clay Studio. If your travel plans allow, join us Sunday morning for a light breakfast and a walking tour of buildings Isaiah Zagar has covered with his mosaics.

AJF MEMBERS ATTEND INAUGURAL METALS EXHIBIT

AJF members attended the opening of "Markers in Contemporary Metals"; the inaugural metals exhibit at the Samuel Dorsky Museum of Art, New Paltz, NY curated by artists/professors Jamie Bennett and Myra Mimilitsch-Gray.

The exhibition was primarily drawn from works in the permanent collection and supplemented by loans of artists who "represent a closely-knit group of practitioners whose shared academic experience, while genealogically succinct, reveals an impressive breadth of individual creative expression."

While mapping a diagram of modernic lineage and activity, curators discovered persistent cultural and historic spheres of influence embodied within the individual works. References from decorative arts, fine arts, folk art, craft, design/architecture and vernacular objects are all spheres of influence-or markers-that have particular resonance and interpretations within jewelry and metals. The exhibition gave the viewer the opportunity to see how "objects are marked by their associations, by the intent of the artist, and by their existence in a particular time and context."

The exhibition included work by: Jamie Bennett, Lola Brooks, Sharon Church, Ramon Puig Cuyas, Bettina Dittlman, Mary F. Douglas, Robert Ebendorf.
